

 - A) Background info on Colossae
 - 1) Dates back (possibly) to the Hittite period of 1700's BC
 - 2) By the time of the Persian Empire it was a wealthy and influencial city
 - 3) Located in the Lycus valley in Asia Minor (Anatolia) near Ephesus and Laodicea
 - 4) By Paul's day it had dwindled to a relatively minor city (about 10-25,000 persons)
 - 5) Known for its woolen industry Colossimus is Greek for "dyed wool"
 - 6) Also known for a cult of angel worship in the 1st Century AD
 - 7) City was destroyed in the 4th Crusade (1192 AD) and never rebuilt
 - 8) Epaphras and Philemon are reported to come from Colossae (1st & 2nd bishops)
 - 9) Many different Gospels were circulating at this time (60-65 AD)

GOYB Exercises for this week:

- 1) What are your duties and responsibilities as a Christian and as a member of a congregation?
 - Make a "duty roster" by activities, frequency, or any metric that works for you
- 2) How have (or are) you suffering? How can this be the work of transformation into the Image of Christ?
 - pick one (and only one) way in which you suffer
 - What is it's cause? (Old age, consequence of sin / behavior, faithfulness to the Gospel?)
 - Read Romans 5:3-5
 - How might God be using this suffering in a transformative way?
 - Rather than pray that "this cup may pass from me", pray that you may rejoice in this suffering and that it may be a way of becoming more and more like Jesus.
